HISTORY HURST TURNER POST

By DR. S. WALLACE HOFFMANN

Hurst Turner Post No. 88 Statesville was organized January 31, 1926 with the following charter members:—

Godfrey C. Kinnigh, Robert A. White, Henry H. Nicholson, Frank Deaton, George F. Hill, Dick White, Joe L. Harrison, John A. Scott, Charles E. Mills, S. Wallace Hoffmann, Robert Glenn Mose, Joe Shelton, Hamilton, Jas. Neely Kincaid, L. N. Mills, Frank A. Hill.

The purpose of the American Legion is well stated in the preamble of the National Constitution: "For God and country, we associate ourselves together for the following purpose: To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America; to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate a one hundred per cent Americanism."

Program: To preserve the memories and incidents of our association in the great war; to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation; to combat autocracy of both classes and the masses; to make right the master of right; to promote peace and good will on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy; to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness.

Our Post has striven to uphold these principles and to contribute to the welfare of the community wherever it could to make this a better place in which to live. It has been served by the following officers:

- 1926—Jno. A. Scott, Jr., First Post Commander, was elected to State Senate and resigned, his successor was Robert A. White, J. N. Kincaid, adjutant.
- 1927—Joe Harrison, commander, O. R. Mills, adjutant.
- 1928—Oscar R. Mills commander, R. Glenn Mose, adjutant.
- 1929—H. G. Mose, commander, Frank Neill, adjutant.

"The Post has been a great help to many in filing their adjusted service compensation certificates. About ten years after the war we could find no complete list of the men from Fredell county, who had made the supreme sacrifice during the war, and the Legion and Auxiliary undertook to make a memorial to our honored dead, and research was made so that these names would be recorded for all time, and this marker stands at the head of Broad street.

Through the kindness of the Methodist church, we were able to have the Hut and the City of Statesville, which permitted us a place to put it. We were enabled to own our own quarters. The work of moving and fixing up the Hut entailed quite a little expense, but we have succeeded in paying off all indebtedness on the Legion Hut amounting to between \$2,500 and \$3,000.

The Legion has endeavored to celebrate properly Memorial day services and the Statesville War Mothers in a dedication of their marker on route No. 16. For Memorial day and Armistice day we have brought some notable speakers here, among them Dr. F. P. Halness, Department Commanders Albert L. Cox, George P. Freeman,

in our cortex have won high rank in the state contest.

The operation of the Legion swimming pool has been a constantly enterprise that has furnished a clean beautiful pool under proper supervision and enabled boys and girls to swim. They have also received instruction in water safety and Junior Red Cross saving courses. These by participation of the local Red Cross chapter.

The Post has tried to get the men a little closer together, and for a while held social meetings on the last Tuesday of the month in the outlying districts. Meetings were held at Troutman, Story Point and Harrison.

During the United States Army band here, and while it came during the time of financial depression, by hard work we were enabled to get out of our contract without loss, which was quite different from the story told in many large places, as this national musical organization requires a very large organization. We also brought here some good dramatic numbers and while there was no profit to help us to finance our indebtedness on the Hut.

In the beginning it was rather difficult to get the men who had so recently been in service to enter in anything, many would not even join the church, and the Post had rather hard sledding for several years. Eventually the work of the organizers and the faithful members who saw the need for the Legion and the work it had to do brought results in increased membership and support. Then the Post began to be a very real service disabled veterans and their families.

In 1928 we won the cup given to Class B Posts for largest increase in membership, having gained 135 persons.

In 1928 we were also awarded the cup for the largest service to the disabled. And again in 1929 we were awarded the Department Vice Officer's Trophy for the best service to the disabled.

Our outstanding work has been for the disabled men and their families having been instrumental in getting many in hospitals for treatment, and in completing many worthy claims.

It did give the people an opportunity to see some worthwhile things. The Post took its part in the National wide campaign to find jobs for the unemployed, and aided in the campaign to find jobs for the unemployed and open an unemployment bureau to 251 in this work.

Among our members who have been honored by opportunity to serve we find Oscar Mills, Department Vice Officer, appointed in 1925 by Department Commander George K. Freeman, Leslie N. Mills, serving as District Commander, Monroe Adams, chairman of the Department Americanism Committee in 1927, and also District Committeeman in 1928. Dr. Colie Sherrell had the honor of serving as Department Vice-Commander in 1926 and has been Department Service Officer since 1921 and 1923.

The Hurst Turner Post has been helped by the war veterans of the local chapter of War Mothers, and its greatest asset had been, and is the patriotic, resourceful and energetic Auxiliary.

Report on Rehabilitation

During these days of financial depression, unrest and unemployment the demand upon our Auxiliary has been greater than ever before. Many ex-service men are seeking work and cannot get. Many are sick and have not financial means to help themselves. Many need food and clothing. It is not always dollars and cents that count—a little sympathy and interest goes a long way when you are below par.

The welfare of our organization consists of any and all acts that will in any way facilitate towards the relief or comfort of any ex-service man or woman in our community.

Our first big activity this year was our Christmas program. National Headquarters report over 61,000 men remembered. This program cost the different Departments and the National Organization \$84,810.00; that means about \$125 a man on the average. This represents the cash expended. It does not begin to represent, of course, the amount of work, time and energy that was expended by our women.

The local rehabilitation chairman's report for the last six months follows:

We have remembered our ward of 13 boys at Green—each month. Amount spent—per month \$5.49 \$30.00

Christmas Box to Orsett 45.00

Each boy receives a Birthday card on his birthday with \$1.00 enclosed. Amount already sent 10.00

Special diet to pellagra patients 25.00

Clothes distributed to destitute families 15.00

Total Amount Spent \$125.00

Post 65 Powers up to Amateur Radio

Ham Radio comes to Post 65

Marconi plays the number and listens to the radio. Don't you remember we built this city?". The lyrics play quickly through my mind as I celebrate the event of a lifetime at Post 65. Though the advent of Ham Radio has long since passed, scientific progress has allowed us to move forward and assist veterans with psychological recovery and national security duties. Hello, I am KO4CWC Randy Amateur Extra from Statesville, NC. Today, with assistance from the Iredell County Amateur Radio Society (ICARS), we are embarking on a new Ham Radio journey for our willing post members. We must include the Sons of the American Legion and the Legion Riders of post 65 in our new venture.

Together with the volunteer examiners from the Iredell County Amateur Radio Society, we are growing in knowledge, beginning with the seminal level of Ham radio known as the "Technician," formerly called a novice. This written test will require students to study a question pool of 494 questions. Only thirty-five will appear on the examination. These are power tests set with a high content validity for rote memorization. Additional kinesthetic learning, or hands-on, can be asserted free of charge. Such instruction is given with a smile from our local friends at ICARS. A case in point is that many new licensees purchase the Boateng UV5R as a starter radio. ICARS like Jimmy Levan (N4SDF), an amateur extra from Statesville, can assist with programming these new radios with a computer APP known as Chirp. Amateur radio clubs are here for us every step of the way. Post 65 Commander Chuck Harris wants to talk to his children in Hickory. "I want to be able to communicate with them in case of an emergency," says Harris. The value of Amateur Radio as a communications media tool is equivalent to an apocalyptic event. The slogan is "When all else fails, use amateur Radio. "Sons of the American Legion Commander Don Carr frequently cites the value of ham radio as covering the vital Legion pillar of national security. "We may also use the amateur radio program to recruit younger veterans to the Legion family," says Carr at a recent Son's meeting.
